SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

This analysis is neither a formal Attorney General’s Opinion nor an Attorney General’s Advisory Letter. This is a staff analysis in response to an agency’s, committee’s, or legislator’s request.

Synopsis:

SB 237 amends Section 10-7-9 to increase the minimum wage to \$10.10 per hour for every state employee and person regularly employed at a state education institution named in Article 12, Section 11 of the state constitution. The minimum wage would increase annually based on the percentage change of the consumer price index for all urban workers. A negative percentage change would not decrease the minimum wage. SB 237 adds a new section to the procurement code ensuring identical minimum wage requirements for employees of contractors under a contract valuing \$50,000 or more with the state.
